






#### BOOK FAIR VOLUNTEERS PLEASE!



A message from Rob McGibbon (alumni parent).

This is a call to action to help STOP a vast and vulgar property development proposed to emerge right by Battersea Bridge. The project - entitled **One Battersea Bridge** - will destroy a precious, historical riverside vista - to line the pockets of a super rich company, its architects **Farrells** and their builders. They have NO regard for the repercussions of this design on the area. One Battersea Bridge (OBB) is the brainchild of **PROMONTORIA BATTERSEA**, a determined and experienced developer with a network of other businesses.

This project features a 34 storey tower rising to 119 metres, plus a huge chunk of other buildings. All this will be built right next to Battersea Bridge on its south side and beside the waterfront. Its scale and density for such a location is ridiculous on so many levels, not least the chaos it will cause during and AFTER its construction.

Make no mistake - this absurdly disproportionate development CAN happen unless urgent action is taken by YOU - the community, the council and beyond.

The deadline to make a comment about this to Wandsworth Council closes on 20th JUNE. We need you to step up and make a comment NOW. You can do it **HERE**.

Please put Netflix on pause, or stop playing Wordle, and spend a tiny bit of time to help STOP the grotesque One Battersea Bridge. This is not a silly sob story - this is serious.

The longterm purpose of this campaign is to have the project scrapped ALTOGETHER. It is *my* assertion that Promontoria and Farrells are deliberately and cyncially proposing such a vast project - with a view to strategically absorb the complaints and then "offer to reduce" the scale to get it approved. This is an all-too common ploy by developers. In fact, Farrells used these exact tactics for the twin towers (laughably called "two dancers in the sky" by Sir Terry Farrell himself!) at its **Chelsea Waterfront** development bang opposite this new Battersea design.

Pass on the news. Tell your friends, your family, your schools and councilors. Bin this build. Back S.O.B.B Campaign.



## Reception Class Newsletter



#### Friday 14th June

#### This week we:

- Used The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch as a focus for our writing. We use adjectives to describe the delicious food in his lunchbox. We also wrote a recount of the story in our own words.
- Learnt about floating and sinking in our Understanding the World lesson.
- Revisited the /ai/ sound in Alphabet Code. We read and wrote words containing the codes /ai/ (rain), ay (play) and the split code, a-e (bake).
- Read the Bible story about how Adam was asked by God to name all the animals that He had created (Genesis 2:19-20). We also thought about how God made sure that every type of animal was inside Noah's ark. This was because they are all special to Him. We discussed which instructions we would give to people looking after different animals and why it is important that animals are looked after carefully.
- Enjoyed a fabulous trip to Battersea Zoo.we learnt about the animals who live there, enjoyed a delicious picnic and had a play in the play area.
- Met the new children who will be joining Christ Church in September. How time flies!

### Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

## Friday 14<sup>th</sup> June 2024

In English, we have concluded our 'Hibernation Hotel' topic. By writing a recount of the story. We included adjectives, expanded noun phrases, capital letters, full stops and fingers spaces to make our writing even better.

In Maths this week, we have been looking at halves and how we make quarters. We learnt then when we put something into quarters we split it into four equal parts and when we half something we split it into two equal parts.

For Alphabet Code this week we have been revising the split diagraph sounds and have been revising all the codes.

In Geography, we continued with our new topic: 'What will we see on our journey around the world?' We learnt about a country in Africa, Mali. We looked at pictures of a mosque in Mali and learnt that it is made of mud and sand. We then compared that to the buildings in England and what they are made of.

In History, we finished learning about the history of chocolate by trying lots of different kinds of chocolate and rating them from 1-10, we then wrote about which was our favourite and why.

In PSHE, we thought about 'kindness' and how we could be kind to our friends. We sat in a circle and gave compliments and comments of appreciation to our friends and classmates.



#### Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

#### Friday 14th June 2024

Well done to my fantastic Year 2's who have been writing their last stories of the year. Using 'The Bear and the Piano' for inspiration, they've created their own characters and changed the plot ever so slightly to write an alternative version of the story. I have been so impressed with the time it has taken them to write, carefully edit and finally publish these stories. Each child has focused on an individual target some of which include – to use an expanded noun phrase, use a variety of conjunctions, including and punctuating fronted adverbials or punctuating completing sentences.

To celebrate Literacy Festival, I would like the children to find and practise a poem of their choice for homework. This could be a short poem, a poem which rhymes or has no rules at all. It would be AMAZING if we could recite these poems to each other in class and even better if they could learn a poem off by heart. Using their sleep homework from last week, Year 2 learnt about why sleep is important for our minds and bodies and created a bookmark with 'Tips for a good night sleep!'.

We will start learning about the seaside in Geography to prepare us for our trip to West Wittering at the end of the term. In RE, we have been thinking about Christian promises to God and in DT we have been sewing together another craft project practising the basting stitch.

Please continue to practise times tables and division facts. Apologies that spellings weren't sent home on Thursday – they are coming home today and it is week 8.

#### Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

In English we have been continuing with our poetry unit. This week we looked at poems with themes and literary devices such as alliteration and onomatopoeia. We had lots of fun creating our own poems each day about the seasons, colours and school.

In Maths we have been focusing on Time. We have learnt how to tell the time on analogue clocks to the minute. We still need a bit of practice to perfect this, but we are well on our way! We have also looked at digital clocks and AM/PM.

On Monday we had a fantastic time at Hyde Park orienteering as part of our Geography unit. We worked together in groups to find different landmarks across Hyde Park. We used our compasses and were racing against the clock to win points. It was a great way to learn more about our local area and how to use maps and compasses to navigate.

In Computing we are exploring the program Scratch. We learnt how to make our Sprite (or character) move using different keys on the keyboard. Y3 also learnt how to make the Sprite follow the mouse. We will continue to learn programming for the rest of the term.

Y3 have Dance for the rest of the half term. Already we have created an amazing dance performance based upon the Roman Empire. We will present this dance next Thursday as part of our Roman day.

Don't forget to come dressed as a Roman on Thursday 20th June.



#### Learning in Year 4 at Christ Church

#### Friday 14th June

In Maths, we continued to explore decimals. We compared and ordered decimal numbers with up to 2 decimal places. We considered the values of the digits in place value order, comparing digits in the greatest place value column first. To help us do this, we represented the numbers in a place value charts so we could recognise the value of each digit, for instance that 0.5 is less than 0.72. We then ordered numbers that have the same digits arranged differently, for example 1.67 < 1.76 < 6.17 < 6.71. We reviewed how "ascending" means rising or increasing to higher levels and "descending" means moving down a scale of value.

In English, we looked at different sentence types. We began our new topic, looking the fiction text 'Mr. Penguin and The Lost Treasure'. We identified single and multi-clause sentences, including subordinate and relative clauses. We recapped how a clause has a subject and a verb, and a sentence has a subject and a verb and expresses a complete thought. We then wrote persuasive advertisements about the cunning detective, Mr. Penguin.

In DT this week, we were joined by darcy turner an artist who specialises in workshop for kids. Our all-day session involved paper rolling to make chairs. Children worked in groups of 6 and began by rolling five sheets of newspaper to make a tube with a tail. This tube was place in a paper rolling machine. Glue was applied and the tube was rolled into a strong stick. This was repeated many times. The sticks were then used by the children to make life-sized chairs.

In RE, we continued our unit looking at why is Liturgical worship is important to many Christians. We reviewed the main ingredients of Christian public worship and then compared these to other forms of Christian worship, including non-liturgical worship.

#### Good questions to ask your child this week:

- Which is greater 5.68 or 5.86? How can you tell?
- What is the difference between a clause and a sentence?
- What are some disadvantages of retouching images on Paint, net?

#### Learning in Year 5 at Christ Church Friday, 14th June 2024

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end. Next week, on Monday 17th June 2024, Year 5 are going to the Ragged School to experience what it was like to be a child during the Victorian Era. We are looking for 3 adults to come with us. If you would like to join us, please could you sign up for the trip in the office, places will be allocated on a first come first basis.

In English, Year 5 wrote a newspaper report about people gathering in Times Square to witness Curiosity's landing on Mars. Children created snappy headlines and incorporated facts in their writing to make their report as precise as possible. Children also used dashes to add extra information to their sentences. Finally, children designed their own space rover and used expanded noun phrases which contain a prepositional phrase to label the different parts of their robot.

In Maths, Year 5 learnt about decimal numbers. They learnt how to add and subtract decimal numbers with the same number of decimal places and with a different number of decimal places. They also learnt strategies to efficiently add and subtract decimal numbers.

In RE, children learned about Guru Gobind Singh, the tenth Guru. Children wrote letters to give advice to worried Sikhs and considered questions such as: can a Sikh travel with his kirpan when taking the plane or how should Sikh endeavour to earn money honestly?

In Art, children studied 2 sculptures by Anatsui and Shonibare and discussed the compositions choices of both artists as well as the colours and lines used.

In Science, children conducted an experiment to test if certain substances such as rice, sugar, salt, coffee and flour are soluble or insoluble. They also tested which factors can accelerate dissolution or not. For example, they found out that using more liquid in a solution can accelerate the rate of dissolution of a substance.

In History, children learned about Athens. They learnt that Athens is the place of birth of democracy, and they found out about historical buildings and places such as the Acropolis, the Parthenon and the Ancient Agora.

#### Learning in Year 6 at Christ Church Friday 14th June 2024

**Drama:** Another week of Drama. It has taken over! This week Year 6 from both Christ Church and Holy Trinity split into their groups: Night and Dream. In their respective groups, each day the actors would either travel to Holy Trinity or Christ Church, spending the day with Mr Tolley and their group, conducting rehearsals. The practice this week have been focused on imbedding characterisation and physical movements to their roles. Keep it up Year 6!



Kayaking: Last Friday was Group 3's first Kayaking session. This group consisted of only the boys from the class. Like previous groups, session one is all about water safety, comfort and learning the basics of paddling, controlling and communication. The group had fun paddling on the Thames and even had a go at raft running. The group are excited about their second session.
