




Recommended Read



Nina Peanut is Amazing (ages 6-8 & up) Author: Sarah Bowie Publisher: Scholastic



Nina Peanut makes "amazing and non-stupid" videos. Her 'How to Peel a Banana' clip managed to get two likes and her 'This Potato has a Face' clip even got a comment (admittedly from her best mate Brian). Despite her low viewing figures, Nina is confident in her creative genius and unique comedic style. But when an embarrassing video of her cat goes viral, she finds herself negotiating the intricacies of online fame, jealousy, rivalry and friendship - all while struggling to protect her creative integrity.

Sarah Bowie's graphic novel is bursting with creativity and humour. You cannot help being whisked along by Nina Peanut's infectious energy and readers will love the quirkiness that she brings to the story. The illustrations are full of comic details and hilarious captions and are sure to keep children engaged throughout.

As well as its humour, this book does also touch upon some important issues for its target readership. The difficulties of social media, popularity and cyberbullying are brought up and addressed in a positive and light

These themes will resonate with children who are increasingly confident using social technologies, especially as they are presented in a childcentred and unpretentious way.



Reception Class Newsletter



Friday 21st June

This week we:

- Re-read The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch and thought about what it would be like to live in a lighthouse.
 We discussed whether we would like to live somewhere as unusual as Mr Grinling, such as an igloo, a treehouse, a cave or a castle. We wrote sentences to explain our choices and also wrote about where we would not like to live. We also wrote a recount of the story in our own words.
- Explored place value with numbers to 20 in Maths.
 For example: 14 = 10 + 4
- Listened to The Parable of the Talents and talked about how Christians believe that Jesus told this story to show that everyone needs to use their talents to contribute to the world. We discussed all of our own special talents and how we can use them to help make the world a happy place.
- Revisited the /oa/ sound in our Alphabet Code lessons. We also learnt how to read and write another code for the same sound, the split or (nose).
- Had lots of fun when we tested whether our handmade boats would float or sink. We made predictions, timed how long they stayed afloat for and discussed which materials were the most effective.

Next week, we will:

- Visit the Chelsea Fire Station on Wednesday 26th
 June.
- Use our summer holiday plans as a focus for our writing.

Learning at Christ Church in Year 1

Friday 21st June 2024

In English this week, Year One we finished our topic on 'Hibernation Hotel' and began out unit on 'Julian is a Mermaid'. We then thought about what a command is and thought of different commands we could give to Julian to help him be a better mermaid.

In Maths this week, we looked at quarters of objects and quantities. We learnt that when we split something into quarters we split it into 4.

In DT, we had a metal bashing workshop with artist, Darcy Turner. We created some lovely 3D metal fish that will be displayed in our playground. This workshop took hard work and determination but Y1 were so good at persevering with it.

In Reading, we continued reading Superworm, were we noticed that it is written in the style of a poem that rhymes. We then looked at the words that are repeated often in the book.

In Geography, this week we looked at different cities around the world. We looked at Beijing, Sydney, New York and London. We then compared similarities and differences between these cities.

For Alphabet Code we have been revising the /ai/ codes.

Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

Friday 21st June 2024

This week, Year 2 have started their last English unit – based on a lovely story called 'Grandma and Me' which has been a great link to their previous RE unit, Islam. They've predicted what they think might happen towards the end of the story and written beautiful character descriptions of the Grandma using words like knowledgeable, devout and resourceful.

In Maths, we revised addition and subtraction. Year 2 thought about 'finding the difference' strategies either by using number-lines or column subtraction. They also had to think about the language used in questions to help them find clues and work out which strategy to use.

In Geography, we have started our Seaside unit in preparation for our trip to West Wittering. First, we are learning more about the countries in the UK, locating capital cities on maps and comparing places like London and Sussex.

We have been enjoying Literacy Festival by reading lots as a class, continuing to read independently after lunch, to our friends and to our teachers. The homework set this week is to continue practising a poem so they are confident to recite it next week at a reading workshop. I have also added in our spelling focus from the week. They are learning Week 9 spellings.

A big well done to Year 2 for publishing stories – they should have come home with them on Wednesday so please celebrate them and enjoy reading them.

Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

On Thursday Y3 got to dress up for Roman Day. It was so wonderful to see everyone in their costumes and the amazing effort everyone went to. We had emperors, empresses, soldiers and commoners in our class. Y3 really enjoyed making honey biscuits just like they did in AD300. We also played some Roman Games, built shields and made job applications to become Legion soldiers.

In Maths we have finished our topic on Time. We focused this week on problem solving and reasoning. We used number lines and bar models to help us solve tricky time duration problems. Please continue to practice telling the time whenever you see a clock!

In Science we looked at different forces such as push and pull. We asked the question 'how is gravity a force?'. Y3 drew some diagrams to represent a push and pull force and thought about how these forces are used in everyday situations.

In RE we discussed Jesus' claim in John 8 that he is 'The light of the world' and what this means. We spoke about how Jesus wants us to see the world as it is and trust in Him and in God.

Lastly, Y3 had the pleasure of joining in for the Midsummer festival on Friday. Thank you to the Y3 parents and all the helpers who put so much effort into the day.



Learning in Year 4 at Christ Church

Friday 21st June

This week, in English, we continued reading 'Mr. Penguin and the Lost Treasure'. We looked at a map Museum of Extraordinary Objects and created our own mysterious rooms. Then, we wrote labels for different exhibits, using a range of adventurous synonyms to describe their origins and purposes. To ensure our labels sounded professional and intriguing, we used formal language, a passive voice and wrote in the third person.

In Maths, we completed our unit on decimals. We reviewed using place value charts, number lines and part-whole models to represent decimals for equivalent fractions. We then started our unit on money. We applied our understanding of decimals to show different notations of pounds and pence. For example, if I have £3 and 24p, then I have £3.24.

In Guided Reading, we continued reading 'The Boy at the Back of the Class'. We thought about the different ways in which the children try to make friends with the new boy. We used exciting adjectives to describe how the boy might be feeling during his first week in school.

As part of their coding unit for Computing, Year Four took part in a 'Robots to the Rescue' workshop at the National Army Museum. They worked collaboratively to create algorithms to instruct their robot to move around an army base camp.

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- What is an expanded noun phrase?
- How would you write £7 and 41p as a decimal?
- What country does the boy at the back of the class come from?

Learning in Year 5 at Christ Church Friday, 21st June 2024

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end. Thank you to all the parents who came with us on our school trip to the Ragged Museum. The children had a great time and trips would not be possible without you. Year 5 were lucky to celebrate Swedish Midsummer festival on Friday and they had a lovely time making head wreaths and dancing around the maypole.

In English, Year 5 wrote an explanation text to go alongside the scientific diagram of their rover. Children wrote an introduction stating their rover's name, its missions and all its special features, Furthermore, children wrote two paragraphs explaining what makes their rover safe, able to navigate treacherous terrain, able to communicate efficiently with earth and what features make it the most technologically advanced rover yet.

In Maths, Year 5 learnt about sequences involving decimal numbers. They learnt how to work out the rule of a sequence and how to fill in the missing terms of a sequence. They also learnt how to multiply decimals by 10, 100 and 1000 and went over some of the reasoning questions they encountered during their latest assessments.

In Reading, children read chapter 11 and 12 of Varjak Paw and practiced their inferencing and prediction skills. They also practiced justifying their answers and point of view by quoting elements from the text.

In Spelling, Year 5 have been doing dictations and they have learnt how to prefix micro can alter the meaning on certain words.

In DT, Year learnt about how bread was made during the Victorian Era. They found out that the average Victorian family used to eat the equivalent of 31 white loaves a week.

In History, children learnt about Barnardo, who founded ragged schools. Poor children used to go to these schools to learn their letters, arithmetic and about the money system. Schools also provided free dinners for children who might have been too poor to eat at home.



Learning in Year 6 at Christ Church Friday 21st June 2024

Drama: This week the drama trains is at full speed! Throughout the week, children from CC or HT have spent entire days at each school. Mr Tolley has granted additional lines and roles for students who have impressed him. The focus this week in drama has been about fine-tuning roles and giving students additional time to learn any new lines and roles.



Black and Blue Project: This week Year 6 from CC and HT were selected to participate in Black and Blue Project. It is a government initiative to prepare children for the move to Secondary schools by focussing on Drugs Education through real life stories. The sessions were held at HT on Tuesday and at CC on Wednesday. The final session (Friday) is held at Stamford Bridge stadium with Year 6 meeting Paul Canoville, who was Chelsea's first black footballer who became a drug addict following the premature end to his football career and the inspiration for the Black and Blue project.



Kayaking: Last Friday was Group 3's second Kayaking session. The wind was strong, and the tide was stronger, but this was a good challenge for this group. Luckily, due to the low tide, the group could disembark their kayaks on an exposed area of the Thames and go mudlarking. The group also had another go of raft-running, this time with two students out of their kayaks at the same time! Very difficult. The boys had a wonderful time raft running and exploring the riverbed.
