


#### SUPPORT MISS BARRIN TAKING PART IN THE LONDON MARATHON

#### **Our Aim:**

Our fundamental aim is to achieve all that is best for our pupils. Parents contribute to this partnership by giving up their time, offering their talents, or through monthly standing order donations or one-off contributions. We value our parents involvement and want our relationship to be a catalyst for positive change. We are driven by our mission to support and empower the children by making forward-thinking progress to the way in which they learn and flourish.

#### How?

In order to raise these funds we host our annual Promises Auction and Elf Auction at Christmas, as well as other events and activities such as Quiz Night, regular Cake Sales, termly Book Fairs, Art Sales, Bike Rides, Plant & Bulb sales, Christmas Tree sales, Music events and gigs, the Mini London Marathon and much more. Our fundraising efforts are not solely achieved through our parent partnership work, we apply for government grants and bids and receive generous donations from Charitable Trusts and individual donors wishing to make a significant difference to our work, and they do. Pooling all of our resources is vital and it is how and why we are the schools that we are today. However, with the increase in the cost of living and many government cuts we must continue to give our time, money and efforts for the sake of our children's education. How can you help:

#### **STANDING ORDERS**




### Recommended Read

Did you know that the oceans are home to 94% of all living things? These vast bodies of water contain multitudes of animal and plant species – all of which have adapted to thrive in different habitats. Whether you bathe in the warm vibrancy of a coral reef or take the plunge down to the darkest depths of the cold, ocean floor, you will be bound to find life flourishing. This book shines a light (quite literally) on these incredible organisms and shares amazing facts about the biodiversity that makes our oceans so special

Featuring an incredibly inventive "magic searchlight" feature, this book encourages children to feel involved in the reading process. There are flaps to lift, fun facts to read and lots of details to spot in the bright, colourful illustrations.

As well as its interactive features, this book is also well-pitched to its readership and its information is clearly laid out in manageable chunks. Children will

recognise many of the animals and will enjoy learning about them before seeking them out with the magic torch.




#### Learning in Year 1 at Christ Church

#### Friday 13<sup>th</sup> September 2024

This week in Year 1, we have been focusing on our letter formation and using the handwriting lines in our English books. Year 1 have had to consider where to start their letters (on the bottom of the grey tunnel) and how big to make capital letters, as well as ascenders and descenders. <u>See below</u> to help with this week's handwriting homework. Last week in Alphabet Code, we looked at the sound /ai/

and have revised the different codes every morning in our 'Do Nows'. We also started thinking about the /ee/ sound. There are lots of ways to make the /ee/ sound. *Can your child remember any?* 



It has been a great week of Maths as we've found different ways to count to 10 including crossing off, counting in groups of 2 and using tens frames. We have thought about 'how many left' using our understanding of numbers bonds to 10. We have read some maths stories to problem solve and proved our answers with reasoning.

Together, we have read lots of stories; thought about what might happen next and why character's might feel a certain way. On Thursday afternoon, they had a special treat as Mrs Hawkins read them an old favourite – Burglar Bill! Reading Records and Home Reading Books will be coming home next Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> September. Please enjoy reading books from home and reading to your child before then.

Year 1 have been wonderful settling into their new routines and have shown excellent behaviour and attitudes to learning throughout the week. A big well done!




#### Learning in Year 2 at Christ Church

#### Friday 13<sup>th</sup> September 2024

This week in English, we have been continuing to explore our story 'The Big Big Sea'. We have written detailed character descriptions, not only describing our character's appearance but also her feelings, motions and thoughts. As you are reading this week, try to pick out some of the key adjectives from the texts you are looking at together.

In Maths, we have been recapping place value, thinking about why we group numbers into tens as well as dealing with ones on their own. Year 2 had some excellent observations about efficient ways of counting, and we found that it was definitely much quicker and easier to count big numbers in tens and ones, rather than just ones. We have built on this idea by using lots of concrete resources (base 10) to support and show our understanding. They've also started to partition 2 and 3 digit numbers by using a part-whole method. Ask your child to complete the model below:



In Art, we have been looking at two new artists: Vincent Van Gogh and Georgia O'Keefe. We explored in detail the works of Vincent Van Gough and created an inspired landscape



In Science, we have been looking at lots of materials, we zoomed in really close to objects and then had to guess what we thought they might be. We then zoomed out slowly to have a look. We then used magnifying glasses around the classroom to look closely at different materials we could find. What do you think this might be a zoomed in picture of?

# Learning in Year 3 at Christ Church

Another wonderful week in Y3! We have had our first full week of learning and routines. Well done to everyone for their efforts this week.

In English we have been focusing on sentence structure. We have reviewed nouns, verbs and adjectives and how to use these components in our writing. We are still exploring the short film 'Taking Flight' and using it to inspire our own adventure stories.

In Maths we have been working on Place Value and extending ourselves to work on numbers up to 1,000. We have been partitioning 3-digit numbers and learning to expand numbers. For example, 897= 800 + 90 + 7. Next week we will be focusing on number lines to 1,000 and finding 1,10 and 100 more or less than any given number.

In Science this week we explored the human skeleton. We found that humans have 206 bones. Y3 are focusing on the skull, femur, pelvis, ribcage and spine in this unit. We even got to explore real bones and meet Barry the skeleton!

In RE we started our unit on the Bible's Big Stories. Y3 compared the Old Testament to the New Testament and the different authors within the Bible. We will continue to look at different parables and stories over the next few weeks.

#### Learning at Christ Church

#### Friday, 13th September 2024

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end. The Year 4 parents meeting is scheduled at 9:10am, Monday 16<sup>th</sup> September in the Year 4 classroom.

In English, we wrote a letter outlining our goals and targets for the year and we focused on including all the features of a letter such a formal greeting, wellstructured paragraphs and a sign off. We started our new unit based on the short movie Tadeo Jones and we used time conjunctions to sequence the events of the movie in chronological order.

In Maths, children partitioned numbers up to 1000, we learnt how to use a number line up to 1000, we counted in 1000s from any given number, and we learnt how to represent numbers up to 10,000 in different ways.

In PHSE, we talked about the word 'individuality'. Children discussed the fact that each person is unique and might have different thoughts, opinions, emotions and might also look different. We used conversations starters and questions to celebrate our individuality.

In Art, children learnt about self-portraits and discussed lines to draw their own self portrait.

In Computing, we learnt about the difference between a web page and a web site. Children explored websites and identified the different elements that can be found on websites (text, images, video, games...)

In History, we started a new unit discussing if it is better to be a child now or in the past. Children brainstormed the differences between childhood and being an adult and the class came to a common understanding of what childhood means.

In Science, we learnt how to use a classification key to identify animals, and we used Venn diagrams to group animals.

In RE, we learnt about the story of Abraham and considered how he demonstrated faith in God.



Learning at Christ Church in Year 5

Friday 13th September 2024

Another learning filled week at Christ Church has come to an end.

In English, we began our exciting first unit based on the short clip called, 'The Swing of Change'. The children started by describing the setting where this story occurs (1930s New York). In particular, we focussed on writing vivid descriptions utilising the five senses. Following on from this, the children also contrasted their description of 1930s New York with a description of a modern city. Finally, they practiced using expanded noun phrases to describe the main character of the clip, the barber.

In Maths, we continued with our first unit on place value. Throughout the week, the children learnt how place value charts can be a form of representing larger numbers up to 100,000 (alongside dienes cubes and part whole models). The children also recapped the role of placeholders in larger numbers, and we discussed the misconceptions that arise when saying these figures aloud. As the week progressed, the children also demonstrated their secure understanding of being able to write a given number in words. Keep up the excellent Maths work Year 5!

In Science, we started our new unit on forces. The children were introduced to friction, and we discussed which forces are push or pull and consolidated that friction is a contact force. The children also investigated which surfaces will cause the most friction and were encouraged to use their inference and prediction skills.

In History, we focussed on Queen Victoria. This was a fantastic opportunity for Year 5 to demonstrate their independent learning, as they researched key facts and information using both books within the classroom and the internet to support them. Additionally, we also reminded ourselves of the distinction between primary and secondary sources and how these can be useful to us.

In RE, we continued with our first unit about Christian miracles. This week our focus was on, the feeding of the 5,000. We discussed what this miracle tells us about Jesus. Children also considered what this miracle tells us about Jesus's divine and human nature.

In Art, the children learned about self-portraits. We looked at the difference between photographs and self-portraits, looked at a variety of self-portraits by a range of artists (including Frida Kahlo and Vincent van Gogh) and discussed how different lines and textures can be used for certain facial features.

I look forward to seeing you all at our Year 5 Class meeting on Tuesday 17th September.



#### Friday 13th September

This week in English, we started our unit on 'Story Openings'. We watched a film clip of the beginning of 'Great Expectations' and discussed how an intriguing atmosphere had been created through sound and images. We then thought more closely about the boy in the film. We generated questions that we would like to ask the boy and used hot seating to create an appropriate back story. As part of our St Luke's creative writing project, we welcomed the author Tom Mogford into Year Six this week. It was fascinating to hear what it is like to have a career as a writer, and this inspired us to brainstorm our own creative ideas based on historical objects.

In Maths, we explored numbers to 10,000,000. To help us write the numbers in words, we partitioned the numbers into millions, hundred thousands and thousands by using part-while models. We used place value charts to represent numbers and Gattegno tables to multiply and divide numbers by 10,100 and 1000.

In Guided Reading, we have continued reading John Boyne's 'The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas' in small groups. We read about Bruno's life in Berlin and compared the description of his childhood home to his new house. By looking closely at the author's use of idioms, adjectives and similes, we identified how Bruno felt about moving to a new place.

In Science, we worked outside in our school garden to classify plants into groups based on characteristics. We used our observational skills to write questions and made flow charts. We then planted seeds and mint cuttings into pots. We will observe how these germinate over the coming weeks.

Good questions to ask your child this week:

- What is a simile?
- What do plants need to grow?
- What is 100 x 359,200?
